#### 1. Leadership Council Meeting Introduction

  - Laura Evanoff gave an overview of the HUD NOFO Competition. The presentation is included in minutes.

- □ 11.2023 FY23 NOFO Priority Listing- Joshua Knowles
  - Mack Haltom and Beth Svetlic recused themselves from the conversation and vote.
  - Joshua Knowles discussed the Rank and Review process and shared the preliminary ranking of projects.
  - Although the DV project is at the bottom of the list, it is only there because it can be picked up by other funding source.
  - We want to prioritize community values like housing and systemic issues to get more funding.

#### 3. Lead Agency Updates

    - The following people were nominated for the Provider Representative seat: Leslie Clingenpeel, Evan Dougoud, Sarah Grounds, Kate Neary, Susan Savage and Christopher Drake.
    - An electronic ballot was sent out to provider agencies.
    - 28 agencies voted. Sarah Grounds was elected for a 2-year term as a Provider Representative. Her term will begin in October 2023.
  - At-Large Representative
    - The following people were nominated for the At-large seat: Jesse Guardiola, Stephanie Horten
    - An electronic ballot was sent out to Leadership Council members.
    - All members who attended the meeting submitted their vote. Stephanie Horten was elected for a 2-year term as an At-large Representative. Her term will begin in October 2023.

- Housing Strategy Update, Kian Kamas

  - The Tulsa Housing Study showed that we need 13,000 housing units.
  - Partner Tulsa is leading the effort to develop the strategy to meet this need.
  - Currently working to understand how to increase Permanent Supportive Housing.
  - PT is also working on a site analysis that can be turned into an active program moving forward.
  - If anyone is interested in participating in a work session to help evaluate feedback on the recommended strategy, be on standby to receive an email.
  - The mayor added that we want this plan to help make the best use of this Improve our Tulsa funding.

  - Jeff Jaynes with Restore Hope clarified that they do not require an eviction notice to help with rental assistance. There is a process for those who have an eviction notice and we have a separate process if you do not have one. We have a 2 million grant for rental assistance.

## **CoC Funding Available for Our Community**

- Annual Renewal Demand: \$4,359,951
  - 10 projects are seeking to renew funding
- CoC Bonus Funding: \$305,197
  - 1 new project is applied for these funds
- Domestic Violence Bonus Funding: \$415,444
  - 3 new projects applied for these funds
- CoC Planning Funding: \$217,998
  - 1 project applied for these funds



## **The Priority Listing**

- HUD funds renewal projects and new projects annually according to the order in the priority listing, which is made up of two tiers
  - Tier 1 (\$4,054,754)  $\rightarrow$  Very likely to get funded
  - Tier 2 ( $(0, 394) \rightarrow 0$  Competitive nationally (some will be funded, some will not)
- **DV/CoC Bonus** → Competitive nationally
  - If a project is not funded through DV Bonus, HUD will consider it for the CoC Bonus
  - **DV Bonus**: \$415,444
  - CoC Bonus: \$305,197



## **The Local Process**

- CoC NOFO Task Group reviewed and revised scoring tools for renewal and new projects July -August 2023
- Leadership Council reviewed and approved scoring tools and NOFO standards of operations August 2023
- Project Review Panel reviewed applications, discussed and scored applications based on scoring tools – August 2023
- Appeal Panel did not receive any appeals requests
- **CoC NOFO Task Group** met to review the recommended Priority Listing although there were not appeals and the rank order did not change.
- Leadership Council must review, may revise, and must approve the priority list for final submission to HUD



# Summary of Review Panel Decisions

- 1. Preserve as much renewable funding as possible.
- 2. Prioritize housing where possible over services
- 3. Maximize resources and increase renewable funding.
- 4. Recommendation: The Center for Housing Solutions apply for the full CoC Bonus amount and use the additional funding for CES for Survivors.
- 5. Recommendation: SSO-CE DV Bonus will not be recommended for funding as a stand-alone project because the panel recommends maximizing the DV Bonus funding for housing.
